

In today's educational climate, safety is at the forefront of concerns in every school. The well-being of our students has always been essential to education. Therefore, EEG has prioritized school safety by promoting increased security in all schools. State-of-the-art, trusted products with proven results have been vetted and

As visitors enter each school, it is imperative that schools know the purpose for the visit. Additionally, it is important that visitors pose no danger or threat to the faculty, staff or students. We now have revolutionary technology which will screen each visitor using their driver's license or state-issued ID card. School officials will know immediately if the person is safe to enter the school or if they are flagged as a sex offender or dangerous perpetrator. If a person is flagged, they are denied access to the school. If they are accepted, a printed or digital ID badge is immediately created, and they are approved to visit the school. During the month of June, EEG facilitated ALICE professional development for all schools. ALICE is an acronym for **A**lert, **L**ockdown, Inform, **C**ounter and **E**vacuate. This crucial training teaches faculty and staff how to respond if an armed intruder enters the school. StaffAlerter represents the A (Alert) in ALICE. StaffAlerter is a wireless panic button that immediately alerts law enforcement in the event of an emergency. Immediate notification is sent of the school. 
